V. What Steps to Take to Ensure the Child is Safe, and CPS is Alerted to Concerns

CPS provides these instructions to the Safety Service Provider before they start working with a family. The instructions help the Safety Service Providers know what to do when they think the child might be in danger, and CPS needs to act or be alerted.

What red flags do I need to pay attention to that might indicate there is danger and CPS needs to be notified of immediately/right away?

What steps do I need to take if I see “red flags?” Be sure to note if there are different instructions during business and after hours.

When I learn new or different information about the family, what needs to be relayed to CPS, and how soon? Be sure to note if there are different instructions during business and after hours.
